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Asia-Pacific Leaders Set Priorities for the Next Decade of Locally Led Disaster Resilience



Phnom Penh, Cambodia – More than 100 representatives of governments, civil society, the private sector, regional organizations and development partners attended in person, while over 120 participants joined online, for the **Localization Policy Dialogue: A Decade of Progress, Lessons, and the Way Forward in Asia and the Pacific**.

The dialogue was jointly convened by the Asian Disaster Preparedness Center (ADPC) and the Gates Foundation. It was co-hosted by the Preparedness Partnership of Cambodia, and ADPC as the Co-Chairs of the Asian Preparedness Partnership Regional Steering Committee for 2025–2026. The event marked ten years of the Asia Preparedness Partnership (APP). It also marked a decade since the World Humanitarian Summit highlighted the importance of locally led humanitarian and disaster resilience action.

H.E. Prak Kimhong, Deputy Secretary-General of the National Committee for Disaster Management, welcomed delegates and highlighted Cambodia's efforts to strengthen community-level disaster preparedness through national and local partnerships.

Opening the dialogue, Mr. Aslam Perwaiz, Executive Director of ADPC, emphasized the need to consolidate the progress achieved over the past decade.

Participants from Cambodia, Lao PDR, Myanmar, Nepal, Pakistan, the Philippines and Sri Lanka shared practical experiences of communities leading risk identification, preparedness planning, early warning systems and local decision-making.

The discussions emphasized that meaningful localization requires communities and local organizations to participate throughout programme design, implementation and accountability—not only as recipients or implementers.

The dialogue also examined how stronger institutions, simplified access to financing, transparent fund management and long-term capacity development can help local organizations move from project-based participation to sustained leadership. Dr. Sisira Madurapperuma, Director of ADPC, called for a transition “from charity to investment” by developing locally identified resilience priorities into credible and sustainable programmes.

The dialogue concluded with an overarching recommendation to establish equitable, transparent and locally led partnerships in which communities and local organizations meaningfully influence programme design, funding decisions, implementation and accountability, supported by adapted donor requirements and sustained institutional capacity-building.
